The Gardener and the Vine

There's a biblical motif of gardens. There's a biblical theology of gardens.

- Two tests in a garden.
- Two bodies in a garden, brought to life, to new creations. John 19:41
- There's a biblical anthropology of gardens: to be human is to cultivate.

John 15:1 "I am the true vine and my Father is the gardener. 2 He takes away every branch that does not bear fruit in me. He prunes every branch that bears fruit so that it will bear more fruit. 3 You are clean already because of the word that I have spoken to you. 4 Remain in me, and I will remain in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it remains in the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me.

The Father is the gardener

- He moves through his garden to look for fruit. Because fruit reflects on the gardener – the more fruit the more glory (v8)
- I have a garden.
 - My identity as a gardener is connected to the garden. The more fruitful the better the gardener I am.
 - With God it's a little different: his garden is fruitful because it's his nature to overflow, it's his nature to be fruitful.
 - And it's something he's deposited in us as well.

Verse 2. The Father walks through the garden doing his job as a gardener – looking for good things, looking for bad things.

- He's always walked through the Garden knowing, but looking still.
- He walked one day and found something wrong and he dealt with it immediately
 - o But also dealt with it in the long term
 - He pruned the broken branches
 - But had a plan to graft them back in
- So God walked through the garden and he still walks today
 - Looking in your life, in my life, in the life of us corporately
 - o He knows but he cares, so he looks. He's the gardener.
 - There might be lots broken in your life but <u>God has always had a</u> plan to put us where we can have life

And the Gardener, God, he walks and he sees the pride of his Garden – **the vine**, **Jesus**.

- He sees these things seemingly in relationship to that vine branches.
 But just because something looks like it's connected doesn't mean that it is.
- Jesus said he is the true vine there must be false vines

- The things we connect to that don't give us life, but take it away
 - bad things: addictions,
 - good things: relationships careers ministry
- o False vines are false gods are false givers of life.
- The Gardener, God, can see what we are connected to because there will be fruit.

Inspections can be scary but <u>God as gardener, gives me hope</u>. I hope it gives you hope too.

- For us as a church it gives me hope
- God wants fruit for his glory
- He wants to grow this church to see it fruitful
 - Will we let him prune us so that we will be more fruitful?
 - What does God want us to give up? Is there something he has been challenging you with?

Conclusion

As an individual Christian this gives me hope

- The good news is that I don't have to exert fruit.
- I allow the gardener to do what he wants to do in my life, painful or joyful, because he sees the big picture.

I have a Father who is a gardener.

I have a Father who is a cultivator.

Maybe I'm in a season of a lack of fruitfiulness.

- What's the answer? Work harder? Give up and be depressed?
- The answer has always been to trust in the gardener.
 - He wants fruit. He wants me to be fruitful.
 - Thre might be pruning, but any cutting is done for my healing.
- This is the season of life, relationship, intimacy and fruitfulness.
 - o This is a season to enjoy embrace what your Father is doing.
